## **Woodland Burial Ground**



The Woodland Burial Ground has been planted as a series of glades and woodland. Currently the trees are immature and plots are therefore only offered in the woodland areas. There is flexibility as to exact location, and the Sexton will be pleased to help you make your decision, either by visiting the site, or discussing it over the phone.

Trees planted include beech, ash, hornbeam and hazel – all native to the area. The glades are cut three times a year to encourage native species and it is therefore important that other planting is not introduced.

Only biodegradable materials should be used in the burial ground and there are no visible markers for the grave. If a memorial plaque is required we are happy for the family to place one in the Garden of Remembrance.



Despite this, we recognise that sometimes families wish to mark the burial site in a manner which is in keeping with the Woodland Burial ethos. We have therefore provided a list of native plants which may be used, once permission has been sought from the Council.

We ask that families abide by the following guidelines.

- If a family would like to sow or plant around a loved one's grave, they must let us know in advance to ensure that the correct location is used.
- Only plants on the list provided may be used whether as plants, bulbs or seeds. Hybrids and cultivars of these or other non-natives are not acceptable and will be removed.
- Please ensure that planting looks as natural as possible, without straight lines or delineating graves, otherwise plants may be removed.
- Nothing already growing in the burial ground may be disturbed or dug up.
- The earth on new graves may be topped a few times within the first few months after a burial, and the soil may take a year to settle fully; so early planting may become covered in soil.
- If plants require watering, families will need to do this themselves. The Council cannot be responsible for plants being eaten by local wildlife.

Any markers, ornaments or non-native planting on graves will be removed by the Council and kept for a short period for the family to reclaim.

All plots can be purchased in advance but **are only single depth**, to ensure that the growth of the trees is not compromised. We permit a maximum of 3 caskets of ashes to be interred with a coffin in one grave.

**Half plots** for interment of ashes are also available in which three casket of ashes can be buried.

It should be noted that although plots can be reserved in advance, the Council does reserve the right to alter the plot location if necessary.
